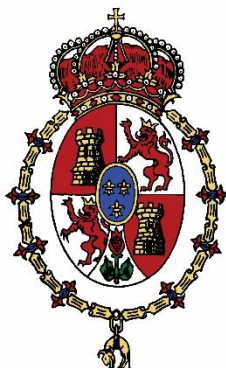

WHEN THE WORLD RODE IN CHANGING CALIFORNIA FOREVER

In 1776, Spain sent a group of strong and courageous Spanish citizens to Northern California to secure the Spanish claim to Alta California. To begin their new lives, these settlers made the difficult 1800-mile journey on horseback to the traditional territory of the Yelamu. This racially diverse and integrated group of Spanish subjects, the Second Anza Expedition of 1775/76, which extended over a mile long, brought with them a new culture to found the Presidio de San Francisco, the genesis of our California society and the foundation of San Francisco today.

The Presidio de San Francisco has become an integral part of the city of San Francisco. It served as a military base for 218 years and was the largest urban military base in the history of the United States. It became home to families from Spain, Mexico and the United States. It has a connection to the American Revolution through its Spanish soldiers and a connection to the United States Navy through a Mexican Comandante.

The Founders of the Presidio de San Francisco created a tapestry of cultures based on the three countries they served, making The Presidio an absolutely unique part of American history.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER

THE HONORABLE CARLOS T. BEA

Judge Carlos Bea serves as a senior judge on the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. He received his bachelor's degree from Stanford University in 1956 and his J.D. from Stanford Law School in 1958. Judge Bea was born in San Sebastian, Spain, and immigrated with his family to Cuba and to California in 1939. In 1952, he represented Cuba on the Cuban National basketball team in the Helsinki Olympics. He played basketball at Stanford from 1953 to 1956. Judge Bea became a naturalized citizen of the United States in 1958.

He engaged in private practice in San Francisco, principally in the area of civil trials (jury and non-jury), from 1959-75 at Dunne, Phelps & Mills and from 1975-90 at Carlos Bea, A Law Corporation. He taught courses in civil litigation advocacy at Hastings College of Law and Stanford Law School.

Judge Bea was named Honorary Vice Consul of Spain for Northern California and Hawaii from 1979-1993, and he received the *Cruz de Caballero de la Orden de Isabel la Católica*, *Encomienda de Número de la Orden del Mérito Civil*, and *Encomienda de la Orden de Isabel la Católica* from the King of Spain and the Spanish government in recognition of his services. From 1990 to 2003, Judge Bea served as a judge of the San Francisco Superior Court. He was nominated by President George W. Bush to the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit and was confirmed in 2003. His most recent publication is BRYAN A. GARNER ET AL., *THE LAW OF JUDICIAL PRECEDENT* (2016).

Judge Bea and his wife Louise reside in San Francisco, where they raised their four sons, Sebastian, Alexander, Nicholas, and Dominic.

NOTES

FORMAL DEDICATION OF THE PRESIDIO

The most formal ceremony of colonial California was the Spanish *Dedication of the Presidio* or of a *Mission*. On 17th September 1776, the day dedicated to Our Seraphic Father St. Francis, patron of the harbor, the new presidio, and the mission, over 150 persons witnessed this event at San Francisco Presidio. The *San Carlos* crew joined the soldados, citizens, and four friars for a solemn high mass and the prescribed rites of dedication. The *te deum laudamus* was sung, accompanied and followed by ringing of bells and discharge of firearms, plus swivel-guns of the transport. Thus was the presidio of San Francisco founded, and after the ceremonies José Joaquín Moraga entertained the company with all the splendor circumstances would allow.

MUSIC

SACRED - ALABADO

No piece of music was more central to daily life in California than the *Alabado*. It is mentioned in almost every historic account of California and the Southwest. It was sung by padre and soldier, colonist and neophyte, in church, at home, in the field and on the trail. In all of the Hispano-American world, the *Alabado* was a part of daily life.

From the rising of the sun until dusk, the *Alabado* was the most common recurring element marking the key points of the day.

MILITARY

Drummers, trumpeters and buglers were assigned as regular members of the presidial companies. Musicians were valuable additions to Spanish infantry and cavalry companies with the signals they provided. Bugle calls were to carry commands to where the voice did not reach.

The principal calls were march, retreat, assemble, disburse, halt, fire and cease fire.

WHO CAME

The Second Anza Expedition of 1775/76, when it left the Presidio of Tubac, October 22, 1775 consisted of approximately 240 persons. There were 39 women and 127 children – 94 under the age of 12. The equipment for the people was packed on 140 mules, 25 extra mules, 500 horses, 30 mares with a few colts, and burros for a total of 695 mounts. Livestock for the Expedition use along the way and for the end of the journey at the settlement was approximately 355 head of cattle.
